Career Stage Expectations

Career Stage 1 - Mainscale 2 + 3

The teacher teaches at a level which meets the standards without significant error. They demonstrate the descriptors with some proficiency.

If not observed, the teacher can demonstrate a basic knowledge of the concept and/or offer a basic explanation as to why it was not used or applied.

Career Stage 2 - Mainscale 4 + 5 + 6

The teacher teaches at a level which meets the standards. They demonstrate the descriptors consistently. If not observed, the teacher can provide sufficient relevant information to demonstrate a reasonable understanding of the descriptor and offer a valid explanation as to why it was not used or applied.

Career Stage 3 - Upper Pay Range - UPR

The teacher teaches at a level which exceeds the standards.

They demonstrate the descriptors consistently, accurately, and efficiently.

If not observed, the teacher can provide significant and relevant information about the descriptor and explain why it was not used or applied.

Developmental Needs

As their careers progress, teachers will be expected to extend the depth and breadth of knowledge, skill and understanding. Developmental objectives must be linked to the Teachers' Standards and address priorities in the School Development Plan, the teacher's CPD and, where appropriate, leadership and management responsibilities.

Standard Not Met

The teacher fails to meet a descriptor in the Teachers' Standard. Part of the standard is not met They may also fail to demonstrate most of the descriptors and/or the application of them often reflects significant errors. The Standard is not met

If not observed, the teacher is unable to offer a reasonable explanation as to why the descriptor/standard was not used or applied.
